# Hut fees and subscriptions

Increasing fixed costs – especially electricity line charges – are a challenge for the club and its viability. Unless we get more members the only options are to significantly increase membership fees and subscription and/or a radical change in the way we use energy at the club. The possibility of poor winter snow and reduced hut usage is not a pretty thought given our high and increasing fixed costs.

To cover these increasing costs, there has been a modest increase to annual subscriptions, maintenance levy and hut fees. Subs have gone up \$10, hut fees by \$2 for adult members and \$1 per night for under 18s. Maintenance levy has gone up by \$50 per year. For more information see the website www.otaihape.org.nz.

the sale – call Yvonne 021 939 003 if you can help out.


Business cards are also available at the hut – stash a few in your pocket to give out to people you meet on the lifts. Word of mouth is still one of the best ways to increase membership.

### **Energy efficiency**

Electricity costs on the mountain have skyrocketed over the past three years, largely due to a change in charging methodology by the local lines company. "The Lines Company" (TLC) have instigated an unusual "maximum demand" charging system instead of the more usual "pay for what you use" system used by other lines companies for domestic and small commercial users.

This means that the amount of line charges we pay for the entire year is determined by our highest peak use over the winter. This has seen our combined electricity/line charges go from an average of \$3,000 per year prior to 2006 to a high of \$7,950 in 2009.



accurately measure our peak electricity usage, which the current meters do not do. Potentially this will increase our electricity/line charges to \$10,000 of which \$7,000 will be line charges.

The lines charges are a fixed cost for the club. To minimise significant increases in our subs to cover this cost blowout, a subcommittee has been formed to look into energy efficiency/alternative energy options.

Extra insulation and double glazing have been installed over the past five years to help reduce heating demand. The heaters and stove are still high energy consumers and contribute significantly to our peak electrical demand. The sub-committee is investigating alternatives to these appliances.

The most cost effective options are heat pumps for space heating and a gas oven/cook top run on bottles. Installation costs are estimated to be about \$25,000. If these options are accepted by the committee we will be seeking funding from various funding bodies.

We will keep you informed of progress.
