## Life membership honours stalwarts

A Taihape couple have been awarded life memberships to Otaihape Alpine Club despite neither having taken to the slopes in almost 20 years.

Kim and Alison Duncan's relationship with the club dates back decades and for the past 15 years they have dutifully taken bookings for its 20-bunk hut on Whakapapa ski-field.

Their dedication has been recognised with life memberships for the both of them.

"They kept it a secret somehow and kept it quiet because we had no inkling," Alison said. "It's an honour for both of us and a big surprise."

Both were keen skiers before they met, Alison first taking to the slopes in the Austrian Alps. "I wanted to get away from London during the Christmas period so I wasn't lonely.

"I went to Austria and learnt to ski with a whole lot of other Kiwis and Aussies," she said.

Kim's foray into skiing began on Mount Ruapehu and he joined the Otaihape Alpine Club in the 1970s.

In 1987, now married to Kim, Alison joined the club and the two have given up much of their personal time for the club.

"We answer the phone for them every day of the year and have done for 15 years."

But it's been many years since they actually skied at Ruapehu.

One of the last times was when their son Richard, now 22, whizzed down the slopes between their legs as a 4-year-old.

Losing all their ski equipment in a house fire in 2000 put paid to any plans to revisit the pastime as "there were other things we needed to replace".

"We stay involved because we want the club to continue in Taihape and we want the club to remain successful," Kim, who enjoys the small, family feel of the 75-year-old club, said.

"It's definitely a family-orientated club and we want to keep it affordable so New Zealand families can still go skiing," she said.

The club suffered a drop in membership after the opening of Turoa in 1978 when locals opted for the nearer ski-field.

Presently about 20 families hold memberships, as well as many individuals, and the club can rely on the Duncans' support for some time yet.

"We need to keep it going. I don't think we'll be giving it up soon."
